Bulkley Valley Cross Country Ski Club Nordic Centre Report for 2019 AGM

The Nordic Centre is getting better each year. The trail improvements project, led by Kevin Kriese, continued into its third year this summer. In addition to last year's new trails (Wild Dog, One Click Right & the Wetzink'wa extension) the primary objectives have been to improve drainage and smooth out trail surfaces. The result has been better access for brush mowing and earlier skiing in low snow conditions. Much of this year's trail work focused on the Pine Creek side, especially the dog trails. Attached is a summary of recent trail and biathlon work.

The trails are in the best shape ever. There is no salvage/danger tree logging this fall so no delays are expected. As soon as we get snow covering our popular trails, we can roll it to set the base and get it skiable sooner than ever.

Our management plan provides a new strategy for our biggest asset, the PistenBully tracksetter. Rather than try to save enough money to buy a replacement tracksetter (more complex, more expensive and less suited to our trail conditions), we are implementing a proactive maintenance approach with the goal of keeping our current PistenBully indefinitely. Last year, we invested over \$40,000 in maintenance to replace hydraulic pumps and the belt. We expect to have fewer breakdowns and a longer period before the next major repairs.

Following priorities in the management plan and available funding opportunities, the club purchased a rubber-tracked skid-steer and brush mower to replace the tractor. We also plan to buy a large snow-plow attachment to allow the skid-steer to help plow the road and parking lot. Funding came from Northern Development Initiative Trust, Wetzin'kwa Community Forest and club reserves.

Last year, at our request, Wetzin'kwa Community Forest removed many of the dead trees near our trails. The logging was done in ways that protected our trails and the recreational experience. Despite the extra cost, the Community Forest made a profit and shared \$29,000 as a special grant to the club. That money is available for this fiscal year to help with some of the projects and to replenish our infrastructure/machine reserves.

Huge THANKS to:

- Recreation Sites and Trails BC for the awesome ongoing support for trail works and signs, especially over the last three years. Over \$15,000 of work paid by RSTBC this last year.
- **Wetzin'kwa Community Fores**t for community grants (this year \$7,500 toward the skid-steer) and a share of the profits from logging adjacent our trail system (\$29,304 this year)
- Northern Development Initiative Trust for \$30,000 toward the purchase of the skid-steer.
- BC Wildfire Crews for falling danger snags and widening trails and bucking up firewood.
- Trail groomers for providing great skiing despite the challenges of snow and equipment.
- **Our mapping crew** (Tom Christian and Gen Perkins) for work on the new trail maps. Gen is currently loading the trails onto Trailforks!
- Work Bee Volunteers for transporting, splitting and stacking firewood, brushing trails and roads, repairing outhouses, scraping loose paint from the deck, feeding other volunteers, cleaning up the sign shed, etc.
